Page 716 "By the close of 1820, the houses at Little Rock did not number a dozen, and were mere huts.....To the south, the furthest house was a log house at the northeast corner of Scott and Fourth Streets, which MAJOR ISAAC WATKINS occupied after he came, in March, 1821. About 1825, Major WATKINS built a two-story frame house on the next block east and south, which was known as the old Stevenson place -- his widow, Mrs. Maria Watkins married Rev. W. W. Stephenson - and which stood until 1880, when it was pulled down after a division of the estate."

page 764 "One of the early settlers of the place was Major ISAAC WATKINS, who came from Shelbyville, Kentucky, with his family, in March 1821. The town was then the merest collection of huts, and the only house he could find in which to stay was a log house, far out on the outskirts of the place, but near what is now the corner of Scott and Fourth streets.

"When Major WATKINS came, he brought with his family from Shelby county, Kentucky, a colored boy, ten or twelve years old, named John Logan, who, at the date of this writing (1890), is still living, aged 81 years, and who retains a vivid and distinct recollection of the incidents of that day. Logan's wife, who came to the place in 1833, is likewise living, aged 73 years.

"DR. ROBERT A. WATKINS, son of MAJOR ISAAC WATKINS, came in 1822, practiced medicine, and became a leading physician. He was the first Secretary of State, 1836.

JUDGE GEORGE C. WATKINS was born at Shelbyville, Kentucky, November 25, 1815, and came to Little Rock with his father, Major Isaac Watkins, in 1821. In youth he received a collegiate education, and graduated at the law school in New Haven, Connecticut."

DEATH: Per an email received from Meredith Gibson via E-Mail: CALMEG47@aol.com dated: Sat, 9 Feb 2002 - Meredith records the following: "He [Isaac] co-signed note for friend, who defaulted on paying...& Isaac felt honor-bound to repay and left devoid of much of his wealth he had accumulated. He moved his family to Pulaski Co. Ark in 1821 and started over & did well. In 1827 he saw man who had stolen hogs from his farm and accused him in public. Later sitting in local store reading a paper, the man appeared and shot him and Isaac died shortly after. "

ISAAC married (1) **Paulina THURSTON**, daughter of Plummer THURSTON and Mary TALBOT. Paulina was born 11 Jun 1780 in Campbell County, Virginia. She died 27 Nov 1805.

Major Watkins was married twice, both times in the State of Kentucky, His first wife was Paulina Thurston, who died shortly after giving birth to a son, who afterwards became Doctor Robert Anderson Watkins of Little Rock, and who on June 28, 1827, married Mary W. Nash, daughter of Doctor John T. Nash of Florissant, Missouri. Robert A. Watkins, was the first secretary of State under the new constitution, serving from September 16, 1836, to November 12, 1840.

Major Watkins took for his second wife Marie Toncre of Kentucky, a lady of Huguenot extraction, and who came with him to Arkansas. The children of this marriage were: Honorable George Claiborne Watkins, who became chief justice of the supreme court of Arkansas, and Mary Eliza Watkins. George Claiborne Watkins married Mary A. Crease, the third daughter of John H. Crease, State treasurer of Arkansas, and Jane P. Newton, his wife. Mary Eliza Watkins married John J. Clendennin, afterward one of the supreme judges of the State of Arkansas.

When Major Watkins moved to Arkansas he brought with him Miss Mills, a niece of his wife, who on November 14, 1827, became the wife of William E. Woodruff, Sr., the editor and founder of the Arkansas Gazette.

After the death of Major Watkins, his wife remarried, her husband being Reverend W. W. Stevenson, a pioneer Methodist preacher at Little Rock, but who afterwards joined the Christian church, becoming a noted minister therein. Mrs. Stevenson died at the residence of her son-in-law, Judge Clendennin, on the 21st of March, 1874, in the eighty-first year of her age, having lived in Little Rock continuously for fifty-four years, a longer continuous residence than any other citizen before her time, and, in all probability, since her time. Her husband died in California in his eighty-ninth year. Mrs. Stevenson was one of the best women who ever lived in Little Rock. She was first last and all the time a Christian, and her home was at all times a home of missions and for all the ministers of all denominations. When the Scientist, Featherstonaugh, was in Little Rock in 1838, he found no place of public lodgment at all suitable for a gentleman. Mrs. Stevenson, hearing of his dilemma, threw open her house to him, wherefor several months he prosecuted his studies, leaving a high testimonial to the admirable good character and magnificent womanhood of Mrs. Stevenson. Such is a brief record of the antecedents of Chief Justice George Watkins, possibly the ablestman that Arkansas has produced.

The following is taken from the files of an old newspaper: 234
Pioneers and Makers of Arkansas

"Died. In this city on the morning of the 21st of March, 1874, at the residence of her son-in-law, Judge Clendennin, Mrs. Maria Stevenson in the eighty-first year of her age.

"This brief notice records the death of the oldest female resident of our city. For fifty-four years she has been a continuous resident of Little Rock, and during all that long period she graced the community by her hospitalities, blessed the poor with her charities, and the stricken in sorrow and affliction with her love and advice. Enjoying through most of her long life uninterrupted health and favored with more than an ordinary intellect, she met the troubles and trials of her early frontier life with firmness and fortitude and was able to assist, counsel and advise those who sought her in their troubles; always a Christian, her house was the home of the mission and the ministers of all denominations. She lived to see her children and children's children grow up around her, anxious to minister to her wants, and surrounded by them she calmly passed away to the rest prepared for those who here have so well done the Master's will.

"Mrs. Stevenson was born in Williamsport, Maryland, in 1793, and when quite young moved with her parents to Kentucky where she married Major Isaac Watkins, of Shelby County, with whom she and her infant son, the late Judge George C. Watkins, and her niece, Mrs. Woodruff, the wife of the venerable William E. Woodruff, resided. In 1820, she removed to Little Rock where she had always since lived."

page 148. February 3, 1860: Letter from Sarah F. Watkins to her son-in-law, William M. Walton, in Austin, TX: "Cousin Henry Watkins staid here night before last. He told me he received a letter from you. He has quit the school in Carrollton on account of there not being scholars enough to have an assistant teacher. He intended to take that car (train) at Winona yesterday and go to Memphis and from there to Little Rock in Arkansas if he did not get a school in Grenada."

Page 150. February 10, 1860: Letter from Sarah F. Watkins to her daughter, Mary Early Watkins, at school in Ellicotts Mill, Maryland: "Cousin Henry staid here last Wednesday night weeik. He went back to Carrollton the next morning to pack his trunk and inteded starting that day to Memphis and from there to Little Rock in Arkansas if he could not get a school in Grenanda. The male school has become so small in Carrollton that it does not justify employing an assistant teacher. He like Carrollton very much. He said he enjoyed himself at the parties this winter in Carrollton very much."

page 168. April 28, 1860: Letter from Sarah F. Watkins to her daughter, Mary: "Cousin Henry Watkins is living at Little Rock. A letter came from him lately to your Pa. He says he is employed as an assistant with one of the state engineers and is getting on very well."

page 162. April 4, 1860: Letter from Sarah to her daughter, Mary: Cousin Henry Watkins is teaching school in Little Rock, Arkansas. He gets forty dollars a month and his board."

The Eighth Arkansas Regiment

The Eighth Arkansas Regiment was organized near Jacksonport at Camp Price in July 13, 1861. The regiment's first commander was Colonel William K. Patterson. The Eighth Arkansas Regiment were mustered into service for the Confederacy for a period of twelve months (later extended for the war) on September 10, 1861. The regiment was surrendered on April 26, 1865.

From the Will of Dr. Anderson Watkins of Augusta, GA, (1768-1828), uncle to George C. Watkins:

"Item: I give and bequeath to my Executors hereafter named Fifty-Shares of Capital stock Bank of Augusta, in trust for the use and benefit of my nephew GEORGE CLAIBORNE WATKINS, son of my deceased brother Isaac Watkins, the sum annual dividends of which alone to be applied to the education and support of my said Nephew, until he shall arrive to the age of Twenty-one years, after which he is to be invested with control of said stock and its proceeds."

"JUDGE GEORGE C. WATKINS was born at Shelbyville, Kentucky, November 25, 1815, and came to Little Rock with his father, Major Isaac Watkins, in 1821. In youth he received a collegiate education, and graduated at law school in New Haven Connecticut. In 1837 he commenced the practice of law as a partner of Chester ASHLEY, and in the same year served as Secretary of State pro tem. In 1848 he was Attorney-General of the State, and in 1852 was Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, which he resigned in 1854. He was at one time law partner of James M. CURRAN, and afterwards of George A. GALLAGHER, and then, about 1865, of U. M. ROSE. He died at St. Louis, Missouri, December 7, 1872, while on a journey to Colorado to recruit his declining health. He was twice married. In 1841 he married Mary CREASE, daughter of John H. CREASE, who died in 1855. Of this marriage were three sons, ANDERSON WATKINS, DR. CLAIBORNE WATKINS, and WALTON WATKINS, and a daughter, MARY. Of these only Dr. Claiborne Watkins is living. His second wife was Mrs. Sophia CURRAN, widow of James M. Curran, and daughter of

Governor William S. FULTON. She died in 1865. Of this marriage were three daughters, Mrs. W. J. TURNER, and Misses GEORGIE and IDA WATKINS."

George C. Watkins was arrested and indicted on the charge of treason, immediately after the War, for disloyalty toward the Federal Govt. He, along with J.J. Clendennin, and 241 others, were not confined in custody, and "most of these cases were disposed of by the parties obtaining and pleading a pardon from the President, under the amnesty policy...." It goes on to state that "no man was punished by the United States through trial in any court of law, for his participation in the war. In all the body of the American laws, no statute could be found to punish any man for having followed the official action of his State...."

In particular, as well, George C. Watkins's property was confiscated and sold..."but after lengthy litigation, which was carried to the Supreme Court of the United States, the confiscation laws were held invalid and the property was restored to its former owners."

June 21, 1875, Little Rock, AR, Dr. T.A. Watkins to daughter Mollie McLemore in MS (portions relating to family of George C. Watkins quoted)

My Dear Daughter,

You will recollect what a very pleasant time you and I had when we visited this place. Were you with me here and were Cousin George Watkins and his Mother living, this visit to Little Rock would be even more pleasant than the one just referred to.

Cousin George's estate was a large one and his heirs get about twenty-five thousand dollars each; except Walton whom he disinherited. The latter was disobedient, dissipated and reckless. I am very sorry for him for he is a brave, good boy. I visited his family and he has a beautiful, accomplished and good wife - no children. He is not at home. His wife was a Miss Treyvant of Memphis, Tenn.

Little Rock has grown to be a city of some fifteen thousand inhabitants. It has many elegant residences and business houses. You would not know the place. Cousin George's children own a large three-story iron front block of building for mercantile rooms and for offices - cost ninety thousand dollars. Please write shortly to me and direct to Decatur, DeKalb Co., Ga. With perfect esteem and respect, I have the honor to be your most obedient and most humble servant and your affectionate Father, Thos. A. Watkins"

June 23, 1875, Little Rock, AR, Dr. T.A. Watkins to daughter Lettie Walton, Austin, TX

My dear Daughter:

A day or two ago, I sent you a postal card. I am so much pleased with my reception here, and my Little Rock relatives being of such high social position, that I must write you again. My being of the family of the Arkansas Watkins gives me a passport to any part of this State. I am quite overcome by their kind treatment. I am more sensible of marks of respect shown me then, perhaps, almost any other individual could be. The long and continued indulgence of yourself and Maj. Walton to my many foibles; the many acts of disinterested kindness to me evinced by you both puts me under everlasting obligations. It is a most fortunate circumstance for me that I have such a noble daughter as yourself and such a true friend as Maj. Walton.

I will remain here about a week, the guest of District Judge J.J. Clendenin and then go on to North Alabama, to be the guest of Cousin Richard Jones where I will tarry some weeks. Judge Clendenin married my cousin ne Mary

Watkins, a sister of the late Judge George C. Watkins. I anticipate a pleasant time in visiting my many old acquaintances and relatives in and about Courtland, Alabama. When they get tired of me, I will wend my way to Atlanta, Ga. where I will remain some month or two and then return to my home in Austin.

"ANDERSON WATKINS, his (Judge Claiborne Watkins') eldest son, entered the Confederate Army at the breaking out of the war as a private, in the Eighth Arkansas Regiment of Infantry. He was promoted until he became Lieutenant-Colonel, commanding the Regiment. He passed safely through eighteen battles, and was killed at the Battle of Atlanta, July 22nd, 1864, while at the head of his command. He was in the 22nd year of his age. After the close of the war, Judge Watkins caused his remains to be brought from the battle field, and interred in the family burying ground in Mount Holly Cemetery."

"The Eighth Arkansas Regiment was raised by William K. Patterson, who was made its Colonel, and who commanded it from its organization, at Jacksonport, in the summer of 1861, to the time of its re-organization at Corinth, Mississippi, late in the spring or early in the summer of 1862.

"At the reorganization, John H. Kelley became Colonel; Wilson of Jacksonport, Lieutenant-Colonel, and G. F. Baucum, Major. During the Kentucky campaign, Lieutenant Colonel Wilson resigned; Major G. F. Baucum became Lieutenant-Colonel, and ANDERSON WATKINS, son of Judge George C. WATKINS, Major.

"Afterwards, Colonel Kelley was promoted to Brigadier-General; G. F. Baucum became Colonel, and Anderson WATKINS, Lieutenant-Colonel. The regiment was in the battle of Shiloh; then went with Bragg's Army on his campaign in Kentucky; was in the battles of Perryville and Murfreesboro; from there went to Chattanooga; was in the battles of Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, Ringgold Gap, Resaca, Kennesaw Mountain, Peach Tree Creek, Ezra Church and Atlanta. In this battle, Colonel Baucum was wounded, Lieutenant-Colonel ANDERSON WATKINS was killed, and the regiment suffered greatly in killed and wounded. Colonel Baucum was never able to rejoin the regiment after being wounded.

"This regiment was one of Cleburne's Division, and participated in all the marches and battles of that command, and surrendered with Joseph E. Johnston's troops, April 26th, 1865. "

WATKINS, ANDERSON Son of Judge GEORGE C. WATKINS who was born in Shelbyville, Kentucky on Nov. 25, 1815. Mother was judge's first wife, MARY CREASE who married him 1851. George came with his father MAJOR ISAAC WATKINS in 1821 to Little Rock. Anderson entered Confederate service as a private in 8th Arkansas Infantry and became lieutenant colonel. He married Miss Sue TREZEVANT, daughter of Colonel John T. Trezevant, of Memphis, and died in 1885. Of this marriage there is one son, ANDERSON WATKINS, named after the elder brother."

WATKINS, WALTON. Born in Little Rock in 1846, youngest son of Judge GEORGE CLAIBOURNE WATKINS and brother of Claibourne Watkins. Enlised in 1862 in Hawthorne's Regiment of Arkansas Infantry, made captain in 1863, was in Trans-Mississippi Dept. under Gen. T. H. Holmes, at battles of Helena July 4, 1863, reported to have been killed

while leading his men over enemy's works. His death was mourned, but the truth was he charged the Federal breastworks and was captured, sent as prisoner of war to Johnson's Island, voluntarily himself to Mexico after the war. Married SUE TREZEVANT, daughter of Col. JOHN TREZEVANT of Memphis who died 1885. He returned to his home some years later, lived at Little Rock.

Here is a brief history of Johnson's-Hawthorne's-Polk's Infantry Regiment (also called 39th Regiment): "It was organized in the summer of 1862 and served in McRae's, Fagan's, and A.T. Hawthorne's Brigade, Trans-Mississippi Department. The unit fought at Prarie Grove, reported 237 casualties at Helena, and was active at Bayou Fourche. Later it skirmished in a few actions in Arkansas, then was broken up before the surrender in June, 1865. The field officers were Colonels John B. Cocke, A. T. Hawthorne, Alfred W. Johnson, and Cadwallader Polk, and Lieutenant Colonel D. W. Ringo."

The following information is from Prarie Grove Battlefield State Park.

Organized by Colonel J. Johnson in late 1862, this unit bore the names of its two commanding officers, Colonel Johnson and Colonel A. T. Hawthorn.

Like almost all Civil War units, Johnson's/Hawthorn's Arkansas Infantry was also known by an alternate name derived from the name of an officer commanding a detachment of the unit at some time or place. Unofficial, alternate names of this type identified as having been used by or for the regiment are shown below.

P. G. Roper's Infantry
Walton Watkins' Infantry

It is likely that the regiment served only a twelve month period of enlistment. During this time, it belonged to two higher commands. These are listed below.

Shortly after the fall of Little Rock, all reference to the regiment cease in the Official Records. It is not known if the members of the unit participated in the organization of any other Arkansas units.

History of The Capital: The magnificent Capital Hotel, one of Arkansas' cherished treasures, was born in the prosperous post Civil War days of Little Rock's history after a tragic fire destroyed the city's most prominent hotel, the Metropolitan. Blazing headlines in the December 15, 1876 Arkansas Gazette pleaded, "Wanted -- A First Class Hotel!" following the Metropolitan's loss. Within a week, Colonel A. G. DeShon and Major John D. Adams leased what was then the Denckla office and merchants building and converted it into the Capital Hotel. Already described as having one of the finest exterior edifices in the South, the interior of the Denckla building was altered by Colonel DeShon to match the grand facade. Daintily figured carpets covered every room, and gas provided the lighting system. A magnetized annunciator enabled each guest to request individual room service by merely pushing a button. And, in keeping with the current fashion among first-class hotels, the Capital provided its guests with a restaurant, bar, barber shop and billiard hall. The 101 elegantly appointed guest chambers carried rates of \$2.50 to \$4.00 per day

The resulting opulence moved a local matron, Mrs. Morehead WRIGHT, to exclaim, "I can think of no name more appropriate than 'The Capital Hotel' as it is a capital enterprise located in a capital building, which will do honor to the capital of the state and, I trust, prove a capital success!" The name was sealed

Born in Little Rock, Arkansas, Ms. Loughborough was a charter member of the Little Rock Garden Club. She was a vice regent of the Mount Vernon Ladies Association, the organization that restored and maintains the home of George Washington. In 1935, she was appointed to the Little Rock Planning Commission, and learned of the plan to condemn the half-block of houses on Cumberland and Third Street (Block 32). Turning to the general assembly, she raised thirty thousand dollars to save the structures and created the Arkansas Territorial Restoration Commission. The Arkansas Territorial Restoration (today known as the Historic Arkansas Museum) opened on July 19, 1941, as a historic site museum with four museum houses on their original half-block in downtown Little Rock. Ms. Loughborough provided daily direction for the museum during the first twenty years of its existence. She died in Little Rock and is buried at Mount Holly Cemetery.
