

Family of William (son of Joseph & Mary) WALTON

First Generation

1. **William (son of Joseph & Mary) WALTON¹** was born 11 Feb 1754 in Prince Edward County, VA. He died 1 Aug 1818 in Columbia County, GA and was buried in Walton Family Cemetery, Columbia County, GA.

Notes from Mrs. Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson:

"GRANT OF LAND: King George IV of England gave a grant to William WALTON, Revolutionary War soldier. (Ella Gertrude Walton Lamkin's home place was located on this grant, in Columbia County, 20 acres. In 1993, the only part we still own of this land grant from the king is the 7 1/2 acres of the home place across Little Kiokee Creek on the Old Washington Road. (These 7 1/2 acres join Elizabeth Benton Lamkin Johnson's property. This home place, "The Oaks" [plantation] from her mother, Daisy Elizabeth Lamkin) and the 7 1/2 acres owned by Robert Walton LAMKIN, Jr., deceased, and now belonging to his heirs (his children)."

"Most of the bounty land was sold to General Robert E. WOOD, President of Sears, Roebuck & Company." (Mrs. Lamkin provided a hand drawn map detailing the lay out of these lands.)

"William Walton, our great-great grandfather, was a member of the Continental Congress.

"In late July 1818, William WALTON was coming home through a section known as Deer Park when he was attacked by a big stag. He was seriously injured, but managed to drag himself home. He finally died from these wounds on August 1, 1818. He was buried in the Walton Cemetery on the land he owned and settled.

"The rock wall of the cemetery was built by slaves in the early 1800's. Four generations of WALTON's are buried in this cemetery."

"The Walton Cemetery is on Washington Road next to Cumberland subdivision (right hand side as you go toward the turn off for going home, or toward Clark Hill) and across Washington Road from Windmill Plantation. There are four generations buried in the WALTON Cemetery. Many Walton families are buried here from William Walton - Jesse Sims Walton, on through some of his children and grandchildren. It is impossible for me to list all who are buried here, so I'm showing our children how many (NOT naming all of these generations that are buried there!).

Generation One: William Walton and Sarah Grinnage Walton

Generation Two: Jesse Sims Walton and Palatine Ellis Jones Walton

Generation Three: George Tatrall Walton and Alice Isabella McLean Walton, and their daughter, Maggie Walton. Lucilious Diogenes Walton and Jane Catherine McLean Walton. Ellis Jones Walton and Mary Amelia "Molly" McLean Walton.

Generation Four: Bowdre Lamkin, died as an infant. Son of Ella Gertrude Walton Lamkin and James Alexander Lamkin. Turner Clanton Lamkin, born May 1, 1887, died July 1904, son of Ella Gertrude "Munna" Walton Lamkin and James Alexander Lamkin. (These 2 graves are marked only by rocks, and are located toward the back right side of the cemetery as one would face the entrance to the cemetery.)"

The Walton/Lamkin Bible states he was born 11th day of February 1754.

I found a tidbit where the property was deeded over to preserve the graveyard of William Walton. Obviously there were burials there prior to 1792. (From "annh" via Internet posting - 2005)

Feb. 26th 1792. WILLIAM APPLING sells to the Commissioners of the Courthouse, for five shillings, for use as a

Courthouse and Gaol, five acres laid out of my premises by WILLIAM WALTON, Esquire, excepting a graveyard not exceeding 1/4 acre to be laid off square including the graves appertaining to said yard.

Same date (1792). WILLIAM APPLING to the Trustees of the Anabaptist Church, on the Kiokee, for five shillings, five acres to be laid out of my premises part of a tract granted to JOSEPH WOOD, Aug. 2, 1774.

In 1794, land adjoining William WALTON in Wilkes County, sold.

November 29, 1794 Thomas HAYNES and WILLIAM WALTON are executors of the estate of the lat Col. Peter Stubblefield, Columbia County, GA.

November 11, 1797 'SHERIFF'S SALES. On the Tuesday in December next, at the court-house in the County of Columbia, at the usual hours.... WILL BE SOLD: The following property: 544 acres of land, whereon Colonel Peter Stubblefield, deceased, lived, joining lands of WILLIAM WALTON and John GARNETT; 250 acres whereon Peter Stubblefield now lives, Savannah River...".(portions not transcribed).

1797, Sarah Walton, wife of William Walton, sold land in Columbia County, GA, September 17, 1797.

June 28, 1798. "Georgia, In the Superior Court, Columbia County, June Term, 1798} A bill was presented on the equity side of this court, in behalf of James Cartledge, praying to have the testimony of John Germany, Sen., an aged and infirm witness, taken and perpetuated; and on motion of Mr. Walker, solicitor for the complainant. It is ordered and decreed, that Peter Crawford, Thomas M____, Joshua GRINAGE and WILLIAM WALTON, Esqrs, or any two of them, are hereby appointed commissioners to examine the said John Germany, Esq. On such interrogatories as may be exhibited by and in behalf of the said complainant....(portions not quoted). "Taken from the minutes, Peter Crawford, Clerk. June 28, 1798."

1799, 'WILL BE SOLD.....544 acres of land, whereupon Colonel Peter Stubblefield, dec., lived, joining lands of WILLIAM WALTON and John Garnett; (portions not transcribed) 30 acres, more or less, Columbia County, whereon JEREMIAH LAMKIN now lives, taken by execution on the property of said Lamkin as in the above recited cases."

October 6, 1804: "VALUABLE LAND FOR SALE. The subscriber will sell at private sale, eighteen hundred and twenty-four acres of his land, in Columbia county, and all adjoining, and laid off in the following lots:

- No.1: A tract containing 400 acres, adjoining Wm. Low and WM. WALTON
- No.2: Containing 500 acres, whereon is that valuable and well known plantation, called "Shady Grove."
- No. 3: Containing 478 acres, adjoining Thomas Cumming and Thos. Moore.
- No. 4: 446 acres, adjoining Thomas Cumming, upon three sides,. This tract will be sold with the encumbrance of five years lease, to Philip Clayton, Esq. (portions not transcribed)....

"Plats of the above tracts of land and the premises, may be seen by applying to Mr. WILLIAM WALTON, and the terms made known by the subscriber at his Mills on Little River. J. GRINAGE."

March 16, 1806. "The Noted JACK ASS, called the Bourbon, Seven years old last grass, nearly thirteen hands high, very thick feet of his height, and has proved himself to be a fare foal getter. Will hand at my stable in Columbia County, on the Petersburg road, about sixteen miles above Augusta, near WILLIAM WALTON'S TAVERN, and four miles from Middleton's ferry, and will be let to mares at eight dollars the season, paid by the first of December next, or may be discharged by paying \$6.00 in hand, (at the time the mare in put to said Jack) or \$4.00 the single leap, or \$10.00 to insure. If insured to be paid whenever the mare is discovered to be with foal. Said Jack was sired by the noted Jack, Royal Standard, and was imported from Spain in 1792, and owned band kept by Capt. Stephen Clark, of Connecticut, New England, and his offspring has been proved to be the best ever sired in America. Pasturage for mares free, but not answerable for accidents. THOMAS MOORE, JR."

WILL OF WILLIAM WALTON:

WALTON CEMETERY, Columbia County, GA:

July, 2004. Katie DeLaigle, in Augusta, GA, was sweet enough to go out on a hot summer early-evening and take photographs of the WALTON cemetery, on Washington Road, in Columbia County, GA! Here is her email about the cemetery:

"I drove up to Lake Cumberland at 8:00 pm and found the cemetery. The wall is obviously made from hand gathered stones.....the land all around this property is being presently developed (Riverwood Plantation).....

"The first marker says W. T. Walton.....born Nov. 9, 1836.....you cannot make out the date of death..... the stone is so weathered and stained.

The second larger marker with "WALTON" on the top of the grave stone.....says

Father: Jesse Sims Walton	Mother: Palatiah Ellis (wife of Jesse)
born Aug 7, 1801	born Sep 19, 1816
died Aug 10, 1866	died Nov 1, 1890

Of course the most important marker is :

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER
WILLIAM WALTON
1754 - 1818

Placed by the Tampa Fl. Chapter of D. A. R.

The broken grave stone has no markings that I could make out.

This is a quaint old family cemetery.....old cedar trees and Georgia pines.....hand laid stone and I got a good feeling about it. It did not feel dreary or spooky in any way.....It, of course, has been neglected. William Walton's grave is outlined with the stone and is somewhat "sunken" into the earth."

According to Columbia County tax records, also found by Katie DeLaigle, Marion C. & Oliver OWENS are the current (2004) owners of the cemetery.

(Note: In "History of the Georgia Militia" Vol. 1, page 94: there was a William Walton, commissioned 2nd LT, First Regiment Georgia State Troops, in 1788.

William married¹ **Sarah GRINAGE**¹ on 22 Dec 1792 in Columbia County, GA. Sarah died² 30 Oct 1833 in Columbia County, GA.

The following notes are from Mrs. Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson:

"In some records, her last name is spelled with one "n", in others it is spelled with two."

"Records in Prince Edward County, Virginia: William WALTON and Sarah GRINNAGE were natives of Virginia; they migrated to Georgia in 1790 and settled in Columbia County, where he 'prosperously planted all of his life' (* "Memoirs of Georgia, Vol I)..... He was a soldier in the patriot army during the Revolutionary War, and for his services drew some land in Kentucky. To pay the taxes on this, he was accustomed to go there every year on horseback. He was surveyor of Columbia County and held the office for many years."

Not sure how related to Sarah: November, 1823: "Executors Sale. Agreeable to an order of the Honorable the Inferior Court of Lincoln County, will be sold at Lincolnton on the first Tuesday in January next, the following tracts of land, being the real estate of JOSHUA GRINAGE, late of Lincoln County, deceased. To wit: One tract, lying in the county aforesaid, on Little River, containing 1300 acres and 10 acres, be the same more or less (and known as the late residence of said deceased,) of which there is about 300 acres cleared, about 150 acres of which is fresh and in good order for cultivation; there is a comfortable two story dwelling house upon the premises, with ever necessary out-building, together with a valuable set of Grist Mills and a Saw Mill, on Little River, all in good order; also a ferry across Little River, at which there is a good flat. Also, one small tract, lying in the county of Columbia, opposite the mills and ferry, containing 100 acres, more or less, adjoining lands of Jones and Eubank, which last mentioned tract will be sold with the aforementioned tract. Also, 261 acres, more or less, in the county of Lincoln, lying in the fork of Savannah and Little Rivers, adjoining lands of Lamar & Boyd. Also, one tract containing 225 acres (+/-) being part of a 1700 tract granted to Basil Lamar, adjoining the lands of Bronson and others. Also one tract, containing 1010 acres (+/-) adjoining lands of Lamar and Murray and Glover. Also, one tract, containing 319 acres (+/-) lying near the Savannah River, adjoining lands of Ramsey and Murray & Glover. Also, two tracts, lying in the county of Irwin, containing 490 acres each, one being No 129, in the 16th District; the other No. 479, in the 9th District. The above mentioned tracts of land to be sold for the benefit of the heirs and creditors of said dec. Terms very liberal, only one fourth part of the purchase money will be required in hand, the balance payable in three annual equal installments. WILLIAM H. HARPER, Acting Executor."

Note, in the Walton/Lamkin Family Bible, immediately under the record of the death of Pallie (P.N. Wood), there is an entry for "N.A.E. Wood" who "departed this life May 14 1817." Possible child?

Augusta Chronicle, May 1860: Sale of Real Estate of the estate of ISAAC RAMSEY of Appling, Columbia County (GA).....to be sold in "December next"...(all acreage +/-). "In pursuance of the last will of Isaac RAMSEY, late of said county, the real estate belonging to said deceased's estate not otherwise devised, as follows:
....."That valuable tract of land known as the "Shady Grove" Plantation, in the county of Columbia, on the waters of the Uchee and Kiokee Creeks, adjoining lands of Clanton, Walton, Lamkin, and others, containing 1400 acres – 800 of which are in a high state of cultivation; improvements are a two story frame dwelling (which with some repairs could be made a very desirable residence) with kitchen, large and commodious smoke house, nearly new and never falling well of pure water in the yard; Negro cabins; gin house and screw; blacksmith shop; barns; stabling and other suitable out buildings for a well ordered plantation, and lying within 14 miles of the city of Augusta.
....."ALSO, the Plantation known as the "Kiokee Plantation on the waters of Kiokee Creek, adjoining lands of Mrs. E.L. Lamkin, Knox and others, containing about 1000 acres, about 500 of which is cleared and in cultivation, the balance timbered with oak, hickory, and pine. The improvements are a two story dwelling, with Negro cabins, gin house and screw, good barns, seabling, etc. There is also upon this Plantation, a tan yard of 37 vats, besides leaches, pools, etc. currying shop, bark shed recently built, and all other necessary appurtenances for carrying on the business. It has a Shoe Shop, and also a house for the superintendent to reside in, should anyone desire to carry on the business of tanning and shoe making, and is, without exception, one of the best stands in the Southern country. It has been established about 15 years, and does from \$700 to \$9000. It is within 16 miles of Augusta, in a healthy country, and society unexceptionable.
....."ALSO,...the Plantation known as the "Dawson Place", lying on both sides of Green Briar Creek, adjoining lands of Crawford, Hamilton, Lamkin and Harriss, containing 800 acres, 500 of which are in cultivation, the balance in woods and old field pines, abundant to keep it for years. The improvements consist of a Cottage house, cabins, new gin house and screw, good barns, cribs, and other necessary out buildings. There is a fine well of water on the place. This is one of the most productive cotton plantations in Middle Georgia, and is also well adapted to grain. It lies within one mile of Columbia Court House, and 21 of Augusta.
....."The above described lands are among the most fertile in Middle Georgia, a great portion being creek bottoms, and are well adapted to the culture of corn and cotton, and health and society are unsurpassed by any location on the globe.
....."ALSO, a tract of land, heavily timbered, lying on the south side of the Georgia Railroad, about 3 miles from Dearing, adjoining lands of Harriss, Hall, Evans and others, containing 475 acres, and known as Lot No 2 in Columbia County.
....."ALSO,a tract of heavily timbered pine land, lying on the Georgia Railroad, containing 111 acres, known as a part of the Michael Magahee tract, adjoining lands of Magahee and Philips. The above is said to be one of the best timbered pieces of land on the Georgia Railroad, and the soil is unsurpassed by any pine lands in the county.
....."ALSO, that tract or parcel of land lying in Columbia County, containing 400 acres of land adjoining lands of A.M. Allen, Robert Bailey, J. Adams and others, about 4 miles from the Georgia Railroad and 12 from Augusta, 20 acres of which is cleared, the balance in the woods.
....."Phocion RAMSEY, William S. MOUGHON, William H. BONNER, George L.D. RICE, Executors."

Ginga,

I noticed with great interest your post on the estate of Isaac Walton from the Augusta Chronicle of May 1860.

I own and live on a place called "The Old Kiokee Tannery". It contains 134 acres. The remains of an old tannery are here. I think that the tannery that is on our place may be the one mentioned in the advertisement you quoted.

In searching the land records, there were various owners back to 1875 when the identifiable place disappears into the estate of James Lamkin as a place of 750 acres and he or his estate divided the 750 acres in 1875. This is shown in the Columbia County Estate records in the book of distribution of 1875. This place is always referred to as "The Old Kiokee Tannery".

Listing the similarities between the advertised place and this one, the old neighbors are the same as existed in older times. I have not counted the vats but there are many and could be 37. The remains of the bark mill are here, namely the grinding stones. During the years that we have been here, the older residents have told us that the place was

called the Shoe Shop place and that the name of the branch that the tannery is located on is called the Shoe Shop Branch. Older residents have told us that many years ago they got old boards of heart pine from around the tannery location to use as kindling. These could have been from the shops or from the linings of the vats.

We are within about three miles of the Walton revolutionary war soldier's grave. The Walton's intermarried with the Lamkins and one of our current neighbors is Walton Lamkin, a nephew of Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson. In route from our place to the Walton's old cemetery and estates, we pass by two old Lamkin Plantations and the Knox cemetery. The Clanton family seat was across the creek from us. The oldest Ramsey Cemetery is also across the Little Kiokee Creek from us.

No trace of a currying shop or bark shed, or shoe shop exists. Shoe Shop branch is a tributary to the Little Kiokee Creek and the Big Kiokee Creek is normally called Kiokee Creek. The two creeks flow independently into the Savannah River, however, they are very close together through their paths and at this location they are two miles apart.

A theory could be that James Lamkin Bought the place containing the tannery from the estate of Isaac Ramsey.

Let me know if any of you are interested in the tannery.

Congradulations, think you've identified my gr, gr grandfather John Ramsey's plantation, Mt. Vernon on Little Kiokee River. Yes, it does have ties to the other Mt. Vernon. John Sr and Jr were Isaac's father and grandfather.

Along with plantation farming, it featured a race track for horse racing and the family owned one of the nations top thoroughbreds of it's time there in the stable, in an age of horse racing being known as "the sport of Kings".

Also from the information of the Tannery, it sounds like it's in the same area as what was once Ramsey, GA during the 1800's. Believed to be around the intersection of the old roads leading north through SC to GA's indian territory and branching of west to Appling.

It was believed to be abannoned after the civil war with the family moving further north into Indian lands in GA around Hambersham and surrounding areas and eventually with a major movement of family members going westward to TX and then eventually up into the Indian Territory in OK. One county has been a major fun investigating particularly, it has changed county names back and forth around six times through history in GA! lol

I have been planning a trip to that area as soon as my research was done in hopes of identifying the specific location and looking for archeological remains along with photos.

I knew I was within throwing distance from Old Washington Hwy and Clanton Rd area, from research I've been doing over the past year with the help of a Cousin. Many of the family names on deeds in this area, we married into, such as the Clantons.

I think your postings here will excite her if she hasn't had the oppportunity to see them yet.

In Mrs. Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson's personal family file was an article entitled: "Columbia County's Past" continued writings of Dr. H. R. Casey, (marked by hand: "July 22, '81, Columbia News")

"Jesse WALTON was the son of William WALTON, who emigrated from Virginia to Georgia soon after the conclusion of peace between the Mother Country and the Colonies, and settled in Columbia County among the earliest citizens. He bought 800 acres of land on or near Uchee Creek and went to work with a vim to make the

virgin soil tributary to the farmer's demands. The grains of sand in the hour glass of time with him "grew smaller by degrees", year after year, and when three scores of years had passed the supply was exhausted and the last debt of nature paid.

"This valuable landed property then passed to the possession of Jesse WALTON. The subject of this sketch was well known to the writer, and I can truly say of him that he was one of Columbia's best citizens, one who was void of offense towards God or man. He was a quiet, law abiding, useful and prominent citizen, served his day and generation with honor and fidelity, and passed to the "world of the hereafter" in 1865, when 63 years of age, lamented in death as a great loss to his immediate family and to his country.

Jesse WALTON, while he took no active and prominent part in politics, was firm in his convictions of right in this as in all subjects which engaged his attention. He was a Henry Clay Whig in the many and bitter contests between that great party and the "Iron ribbed", "Unterrified" Democracy. At the demise of the Wig party he, with many other good and influential citizens, joined what was then known as the American or "Know Nothing" party. He was not a bitter partisan. He never allowed his political feelings to influence him in his social relations, but was always and everywhere kind, courteous and frank in all his dealings with his fellow men. He was by nature a gentleman, open, sincere, honest, noble and just. When he asserted anything as the truth, his word was as good as his bond.

"Jesse WALTON married in early life a daughter of Elias JONES, another of Columbia County's old citizens, who lived near the old town of Wrightsboro, very near that old-time reflect of the past the "Quaker Cemetery", which, though in a dilapidated condition, stands today a memory and a landmark of the Long Age. And here, I will add, on passing, that a colony of Quakers pitched their tenys and built them a local habitation and a name - Brandon - which was the name of the place until changed in honor of General Wright to the present name of Wrightsboro.

"At the death of Elias Jones, Jesse Walton, on right to his wife, became possessed of his valuable tract of about 1,400 acres, which added to his possessions on Uchee Creek, made him the owner of 6,200 acres. At his death he owned, I think, about 150 slaves. He left a widow and 8 children - 6 sons and 2 daughters - all of whom are still living. Mrs. WALTON, with her youngest daughter, Miss Ella, and Dr. Robert WALTON, still occupy the old Homestead, in the fork of the Peters' Ferry and Washington roads.

"Dr. Robert WALTON is a young physician of true promise. In common with every member of the family, I believe, save one, he is a good Methodist, and I anticipate for him a future of much usefulness. Of Miss Ella, I could write in much praise - Her moral worth constitutes her a prize far above rubies. The writer well knows Miss Ella's great aversion to anything like a public mention of her charms, therefore, my pen without prejudice or affection, in speaking has great merit and many virtues, will only say that, to her household and many friends, she is a "Pearl of great price.

"The writer well remembers some of the pleasant reminiscences of these yearly recreations; and, as memory recurs to these happy episodes in life, there comes the said thought of many of these dear friends who were ever foremost in giving zest and life to those innocent amusements, have passed away from this worldly rock to hid themselves in that Rock of Ages, cleft for them in that upper and better world. One among those pleasant days comes to me in especial remembrances when with Isaac Ramsey, that prince of good fellows in all the worldly pleasures; we inaugurated what was then and for many years after known as the "Jaybird". While it was not a regular dance (for their were some in these social gatherings who were interdicted to this innocent amusement) yet we went through the motion near akin to the Old Virginal Reel, to the merry tune of the violin and the song of "DeJaybird sot on a swinging limb, He winked at me and I winked at him." But this was in the long ago, when we would do as we cannot do now.

Had we a railroad from Augusta, running near this immense quarry of granite, we could furnish the material to build up that city in extense, with factories and mills, all up the canal to the Locks. Hasten up President Wheelless, your Augusta and Knoxville railroad, and here you will have granite enough for all your brides and culverts."

The above was in articles written for the Columbia Sentinel in 1883.

WILLIAM T. WALTON, Farmer, Kiokee, Columbia Co, GA, son of Jesse S. Palatiah (Jones) Walton, was born in Columbia County in 1836. His paternal great-grandfather was a native of England and emigrated to this country and settled in Virginia about the middle of the last century. His grandparents were William and Sallie (Grinnage) Walton, natives of Virginia. They migrated to Georgia in 1790 and settled in Columbia County, where he prosperously planted all his life. He was a soldier in the patriot army during the Revolutionary War, and for his services drew some land in Kentucky. To pay the taxes on this he was accustomed to go there very year on horseback. He was surveyor of Columbia County, was raised a planter and made it a life pursuit with marked success. His maternal great-grandfather, Jones, was a native of Wales, England, and emigrated to this country before the Revolutionary War. His mother was a daughter of Ellis, son of the above, and Mary (Pinson) Jones. He was born in Columbia County, near where Harlem now stands, was a large planter, and grew to be what was considered wealthy in this day, and became a leading, influential citizen. Mr. Walton was raised on the plantation and received a collegiate education, graduating in 1856. In 1864 he enlisted in Terrell's artillery company, but in a short time left the service on account of ill health and returned home. He has since devoted himself to planting, and has been content with its pleasures and profits. He is the proprietor of a large estate and is a leading citizen in the county, in which he is held in high esteem. Mr. Walton was married in 1860 to Miss Marry - born in Colombia County in 1841 - daughter of Benjamin Berry, a native of Maryland. His father was a native of England, and immigrated to this country and settled in that state. Of the children born to Mr. and Mrs. Walton seven survive:

Emma, wife of Thomas B. Dozier; Benjamin B; William T; Pollie E; France J; Eloise M. and Ruth. Himself and wife are active members of the Methodist church."

William married **Mary Simmons BERRY**¹, daughter of Benjamin BERRY and Emily Frances ALEXANDER, on 24 May 1860. Mary was born 1841.

Lamkin/Walton Bible states they were married the "23rd day of May, 1860"

Also in this Bible there is an entry for the birth of "Mary Berry Dozier" June 15, 1881 (?)

Notes from Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson: "Mary Simmons Berry married William Thomas Walton in a Wagnerian wedding feast at "Cedar Grove" in 1859. 100 slaves were part of her dowry. William Thomas Walton was brother of Ella Gertrude Walton Lamkin, (grandmother of Elizabeth B. Lamkin Johnson), and Emily Frances Alexander was sister of Mary Ann Elizabeth Alexander, grandmother of Robert Walton Lamkin, Sr."

'PLANTATION LIFE FLOURISHED AT CEDAR GROVE.

October 1, 1888: The friends and acquaintances of Mr. and Mrs. Green Mays, of Mr. Jeff Luke, Miss Mary Luke, and of Mrs. ADALINE LUKE are respectfully invited to attend the funeral of the latter from her late residence, corner of Gwinnett and Jackson Streets, this Sunday morning at 10 o'clock.

"In the mid-1800's, Columbia County was studded with antebellum homes surrounded by sprawling plantations. Cotton fields spread across the county like a patchwork quilt. One of these plantations was Cedar Grove, which extended from the present Columbia Square Shopping Center to Bel-Air Road. The old plantation house of Cedar Grove stands today behind the Our Savior Episcopal Church on Columbia Road and currently is used as the parish house.

Cedar Grove was built by a wealthy planter, Benjamin Berry, who married Emily Frances Alexander of Virginia, daughter of the family for whom Alexandria, Va., was named. In 1861, Berry purchased a tract of land known as the "Fitten Tract." The tract consisted of 696 acres for which Berry paid \$6,000. On this land, Berry built his home which he named Cedar Grove. The original house was an imposing two-story structure with solid pillars. Two wings were added to the house several years later. The house is formal and balanced both upstairs and down with large rooms on either side of a main hall. Each room of the original house had a fireplace for heat in the winter. The foundation of the house was built on trunks of cedar trees and the beams are roughly cut hand-hewn timbers. The house was crowned with an ornate wrought-iron balcony imported from Europe. The Berry family lived surrounded by wealth and slaves. But their lives were not without misfortune. Berry's son, Edgar, born on Oct. 8, 1852, died at the age of 2 and his tombstone lies to the right of the house, enclosed in a small wrought iron fence. But the Berry family experienced joyful occasions in Cedar Grove as well. Berry's daughter, Mary, was married to William Walton in a lavish wedding at Cedar Grove in 1859. On the day of the wedding, Mary's father reportedly led the bridal couple onto the balcony to present the young couple with a dowry. There, amidst a grove of cedar trees, stood 100 slaves which Berry gave to Mary and William as a wedding gift. Columbia County had a very large slave population at this time. A census taken in Columbia County in 1859 counted 3,731 free whites, 83,000 slaves and 66 free people of color. Owning slaves was nothing new to William Walton. He was the son of William and Sallie Walton, who came to Columbia County from Virginia in 1790 and owned a plantation in what is now Harlem, GA. His cousin was George Walton, signer of the Declaration of Independence from Georgia. William grew up on a plantation and graduated from college in 1836. He became county surveyor and a successful and wealthy planter. But the cannons of Civil War sounded the death toll of the old economic order of the South. The days of slavery and the plantation system were coming to an end.

It was during the Civil War when Benjamin Berry died. Berry was a very wealthy man at the time of his death. In

his will, he left to "Daughter Amanda Lamkin, the Upper Plantation on Kiokee Creek. To Daughter Mary S. Berry, \$10,000 worth of slaves, furniture and provisions and crops. To his widow, Frances, and his son Benjamin, he left "the plantation known as Fitten Place, the house in which I know live (Cedar Grove) furniture and Negroes, share and share alike."

After Berry's death, Frances attempted to keep the plantation together during the chaotic years of the war. In 1863, Mrs. Berry attended a meeting to make uniforms for Confederate soldiers. At this meeting, she met Gen. George Washington Evans of the Confederate army. Evans was well known in the Augusta area. He was born in Augusta and attended Richmond Academy. At 18 he moved to a plantation in Burke County. He later became a wealthy and respected businessman and was twice mayor of Augusta. The couple fell in love and planned to be married. In a prenuptial agreement, Evans agreed that Cedar Gove would remain in the Berry family and he signed away all claims to the house and land. On May 27, 1876, Evans died at Cedar Grove and he is buried in the Magnolia Cemetery in Augusta. Several years later, when a train station was built behind Cedar Grove, it was named Evans in his honor. The town of Evans also was named for him.

Frances Berry (Evans) lived on in Cedar Grove until her death, when the house passed into the hands of Mary Berry Walton. Mary in turn transferred the property to Ophelia Dozier, a niece. Eighteen years later, Cedar Grove found itself in trusteeship for Ophelia's two daughters. Finally, in 1908, one of the daughters sold the property to John Bivens and the Berry family lost control of the land. But the house was still a grand house. During the presidency of William Howard Taft, 1909-1913, Taft visited Cedar Grove to attend a barbecue. Additional cedar trees were planted in honor of his visit. The next owner of the house was Charles Bohler. During this time, the house came to be known as the Bohler Mansion.

The house, one of the oldest in Columbia, now is used for an array of civic and religious activities. The former plantation house looks slightly out of place behind the modern one-story church which sits directly in front of the house. Cedar Grove, which was built with slave labor, housed the first integrated kindergarten in Columbia County, known as the Cedar Grove Kindergarten. The kindergarten, which was sponsored by the DuPont foundation, operated from January 1970 to June 1980. Many of the trees surrounding the house have been cut down, but the horseshoe-shaped drive which circle the house, is still partially lined with the cedar trees for which the plantation was named."

"Mrs. Clanton was in her 83rd year, and was born in Columbia County, about 18 miles from Augusta, on the Washington Road. She was one of nine children of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Walton and their home, "Liberty Point," was one of the fine old plantation homes of that section, a part of the land having been given as a grant to Mrs. Clanton's grandfather, W. S. Walton, from King George III. Until two years ago she made her home in Harlem. She was the widow of the late James Clanton, of Columbia County.

"Mrs. Clanton was a woman of broad culture, and typically representative of the old South. She was an ideal hostess and entertainer, and for years maintained the kind of home for which Columbia County, in that day, was proverbial. Of deep piety and sincere religious conviction, her life had ever been one of tender ministrations, and though for several years and infirmities of age have handicapped her in her activities, many will recall, with pleasant memories, her presence, which was always a benediction. She has survived by her son, Turner W. Clanton, of Atlanta; one granddaughter, Mrs. Jewel Gainey, of Quincy, FL, a sister, Mrs. J. A. Lamkin, Sr. Augusta, and a number of nieces and nephews.

"Her funeral took place Monday afternoon in Atlanta, and interment in West View cemetery, followed."

Gibbs of Martinez, GA; two brothers, R.W. Walton of Martinez and George T. Walton of Harlem, GA; and a number of nieces and nephews."

William married **Annie Lou TANKERSLEY**¹. Annie died 21 Mar 1963 in Augusta-Richmond County, GA and was buried in Marvin Methodist Church Cemetery, Augusta, GA.

Notes from Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson:

"Ella Walton Lamkin died at age 91 years."

"Over a period of several years, many Sunday afternoons, my paternal grandmother - Ella Gertrude Walton Lamkin ("Munna")- would say to my father, "Walton, let's ride up to see Carlton Smith." My father nearly always did what "Munna" requested him to do. We would ride from "The Oaks" (our home) to "Woodville" (the McLean home where Carlton Smith and Mattie McLean Smith lived), on Dozier Road, nearly Appling at Winfield, GA.

"Every one, young and old, called older relatives and others "Cousin". We called Carlton Smith - "Cousin Carlton". In my youth I accepted this term and never gave it much thought. Now that I am 76 years old and Munna, Momma, and Papa are gone, and I can't fire questions to them as, "How are we kin to Cousin Carlton and Cousin Edward Smith?"...I am anxious to trace the relationship!

"Hilda (her cousin) and I borrowed two books written and compiled by Carolyn McLean Smith Whipple: "Dr. William Niblo McLean Family," c. 1980, and "The John Edward Smith Family," n.d. Shirley Smith Johnson was kind enough to let us research them. Also, we knew from the "Walton Family Bible" that three Walton's, brothers of "Munna", had married three McLean sisters.

"Munna taught us to call "Cousin" Carlton and "Cousin" Edward Smith because she was related to the McLean's through her three brothers' marriages to the three sisters.

"Hilda and I remember happy visits to "Woodville", a beautiful place that all of our children and grandchildren should see. A trip well worth your time!

"Hilda and I could stand straight and tall inside the fireplace. They were the biggest ones we'd ever seen in our life at our time, and still are the largest fireplaces!

"Beautiful surrounding there, porch, yards, etc. Delicious cakes, tea cakes, and a drink were always served us. It was and is a most fascinating place and still full of memories for us.

(some information is provided on "good family friends, and only related to Munna through her three brother's marriages)

"Hilda's and my boys may recall me of the Dr. McLean houses and cemeteries, located on the Tubman Road, from "The Oaks" - cross the branch (Delph Branch) and just at the sharp curve on Tubman Road where it turns to connect to the Washington Road. (Mrs. E. provided a hand drawn map of the area).

"The McLean House was inherited by Aunt Ethel Lamkin Davenport, my mother's sister. The house was demolished for progress several years ago when the black people built many houses after Walter Davenport and Martha Parker sold this part of Aunt Ethel's property.

"I believe the cemetery was demolished when Tubman Road was paved, etc. Unbeknowing to the Highway Department, as the graves were sinking and disappear long before the road was paved. The marble slabs were so near the dirt country road - when I was a child - did not invite much traffic as there were only five houses between our house on Tubman Road to the Washington Road. Not many automobiles at all - people walked to school, church, fields, etc."

Augusta Chronicle:

January 20, 1924 "Mrs. Ella LAMKIN has returned from a visit to her son, Mr. Walter [Walton] LAMKIN, in North Augusta."

October 26, 1925 "Mrs. Ella LAMKIN is spending some time here with the family of her son, Mr. Walton LAMKIN."

July 4, 1933: "The Oaks," fine old home of the Walton Lamkin's, in Columbia County, was the scene Saturday of a reunion in honor of the 81st birthday of Mrs. James A. Lamkin, Sr., an occasion which assembled 30 guests including her five sons and their families. Crape myrtle, gaillardia and gorgeous zinnias, garnered from the Lamkin gardens filled bowls, vases and baskets throughout the house, and combined, formed the huge centerpiece of the massive table from which was served a sumptuous repast.

"Those present were...Mr. and Mrs. R. Walton Lamkin, Miss Elizabeth Lamkin, Walton, Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Griffith Lamkin, Miss Betsy Lamkin; Mr. and Mrs. Phinizy Lamkin, Miss Hilda Lamkin; Mr. Hugh Lamkin and Mr.

David Paysinger and Mrs. Turner Clanton, off of Evans, GA., Mr. and Mrs. Francis E. Lamkin, and Miss Evelyn Lamkin; Mrs. Ada Walton, Harlem; Mrs. Mary Jesse Vollaton, Mrs. Tom Norvell, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Reese, Mrs. Lucille Reese, Cooper, of Grovetown; Miss Edith Walton, Chattanooga; Mrs. Clara Lou Ivey, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Lamkin and Miss Martha Davis Lamkin, Augusta; and Mr. J. B. Davenport, Jr., North Augusta.

"The guest of honor, whose charm and graciousness are characteristic of the old school, and whose presence at any gathering is a benediction, received many gifts from relatives and friends with the many good wishes that there would be many more similar assemblages, with herself the central figure."

April 13, 1944: "MRS. ELLA G. LAMKIN PASSES AT RESIDENCE. Mrs. Ella Gertrude Lamkin, 91, well known Columbia County resident, and mother of G.B. Lamkin, county commissioner of Columbia County, died yesterday at the residence of her son, R.W. Lamkin, 1943 Walton Way, after an illness of 3 months. Funeral services will be held at Platt's chapel this afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Rev. Paul A. Turner, assisted by the Rev. I.T. Hawk, will officiate. Interment will be in Harlem, GA cemetery. Pallbearers will be: L.O. Ballentine, J.G. Sells, Joe Hatcher, Harlem; John Ayers, Evans; G.D. Pollard and J.E. Eubank, Appling, GA. Mrs. Walton [Lamkin] was the daughter of the late Jesse Walton and Pallatia Jones, and the wife of the late James A. Lamkin, Sr. She was a member of St. John's Methodist Church and a woman who delighted in doing thoughtful things and aiding everyone in distress. She had a bright and vivacious mind which made her an interesting companion despite her age. She always retained the outlook of youth and the keen interest in things that had distinguished her for her entire life. Survivors are five sons, R.W. Lamkin, James A. Lamkin, and Phinizy Lamkin, all of Augusta; G.B. Lamkin of Evans, and F.E. Lamkin of Harlem; six grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews."

Munna married¹ **James Alexander (I) LAMKIN** ""Pa-Jim""¹, son of Augustus "Gus" B. LAMKIN and Mary Ann Elizabeth ALEXANDER ""Betsy"", on 14 Nov 1882. "Pa-Jim" was born 5 Oct 1850 in Columbia County, GA. He died 14 Apr 1922 in Columbia County, GA and was buried in Harlem Cemetery, Harlem, GA.

Notes from Mrs. Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson: "He died while laughing at a baseball game (I believe in Pumpkin Center, GA). They are both interred in Harlem (Georgia) Cemetery."

"Memoirs of Georgia"

"JAMES A. LAMKIN, a prosperous farmer, Kiokee, Columbia Co., was born in Columbia County, in 1850. His father, Augustus Lamkin, was also a native of Columbia county, was a farmer and race-horse man, and traveled over the state, taking part in all the leading races. He was successful in business, was highly respected and lived in his native county until he died in 1869. His parents were James and Katie (Smith) Lamkin. James Lamkin was a native of Virginia, but came to Georgia and settled in Columbia county, when a young man, and was one of the early settlers of that county. When he came to Georgia he was a very poor man, but was successful and accumulated a large fortune. Mr. James A. Lamkin's mother was a daughter of James Alexander, who was a native of Columbia county. He fought in the battle of New Orleans as a major. Mr. James A. Lamkin, the subject of this sketch, was reared on the farm and received a limited education. In 1882 he married Miss Ella Walton, daughter of Jesse and Palatil (Jones) Walton. Mr. Walton was born in Columbia county; was a successful farmer, and lived and died in the county of his birth. Mr. and Mrs. Lamkin had six sons: Walton, James A., Clanton, Griffith, Jacob P. and Frank E. He started life with very little, but by hard work and diligent application to business was successful, and now owns 3,000 acres of choice land, a gin mill, saw mill, and other property. He was deputy sheriff of his county six years and is a highly respected member of the Masonic fraternity. His wife was born in Columbia county, in 1852. He is an active and useful member of the Methodist Episcopal Church."

Augusta Chronicle, 1875: "Columbia Superior Court-September Term, 1875: "We, the undersigned Grand Jurors, selected, chosen and sworn for this term of the Court, beg leave to make the following general presentments: "ROADS. We find the roads in the county as a general thing to be in a bad condition, caused somewhat by the drought, the parties being unable to have them worked. Augusta Chronicle, March 3, 1875. The Medical College of Georgia, "now the Medical Department of the State University" held commencement exercises at the Masonic Hall. Among those receiving their Degree of Doctor of Medicine were Henry C. Walton of Wilkes County and Robert J. Walton of Columbia County, GA.

Augusta Chronicle, April 11, 1925: 'DR. ROBERT J. WALTON, OF HARLEM, DEAD. Funeral Services to be Conducted Sunday Morning. Dr. Robert J. Walton, prominent citizen of Harlem, GA died at a local hospital early last night following an illness that had extended over a period of several months. Funeral services will be conducted at the graveside in the Harlem cemetery tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

"Dr. Walton had been in failing health for some time, having never quite recovered from the shock which followed the accidental death of his son, Robert, several years ago. Dr. Walton had been under treatment at the local hospital but had recently so improved as to return to his home. Yesterday morning his condition became grave and he was rushed to the hospital where he passed away quietly at 6:05 pm.

"Besides his wife, Mrs. Ada Zachary Walton, Dr. Walton is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Jennie Martin of Harlem; two sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Clanton and Mrs. James Lamkin or Harlem; a number of nieces and nephews and other relatives throughout this section of Georgia.

"Dr. Walton was a sterling citizen and a devout Christian. He was an active and loyal member of the Harlem Methodist church and a citizen always interested in the progress and uplift of his community. He began the practice of medicine many years ago, having received his medical education at the University of Georgia Medical School in Augusta. Dr. Walton was born on the old Walton plantation near Evans, GA., where he spent his early life.

"Besides the practice of medicine, Dr. Walton had been identified with other business ventures and was a most successful business man. For many years he conducted a drug store at Harlem in the practice of his chosen profession. Dr. Walton represented all that was high and noble and was a typical representative of the country doctor, whose name has become blessed to those who felt the touch of his ministering hand. He was kind and sympathetic, a man loved by everybody who knew him, and his friends were numbered by the hundreds.

"He was a devoted husband and father, and his thoughts were always for his family and loved ones. In his everyday life he practiced the principle of brotherly love and was a man four-square to the world who never harmed or spoke ill of anyone. Throughout Columbia County he was loved like a father for it was there that he was known best and where he administered to suffering humanity unselfishly and without thought of pecuniary gain."

Robert married¹ (1) **Margaret ("Maggie") DENT** "Muddie", daughter of Dr. W. H. DENT, on 10 Apr 1884. Muddie was born 1864. She died 25 Sep 1918 in Harlem (Augusta), GA.

Augusta Chronicle: May 30, 1907 "Mrs. Dent, of Waynesboro, GA is in Harlem on a visit to her daughter, Mrs. Robert J. Walton, on Tripe Street."

September 26, 1918: "MRS. R. J. WALTON, OF HARLEM, GA., DEAD. Harlem, Ga., September 25th: The death is announced of Mrs. R. J. Walton, who passed away today at 10 o'clock at her borne. The funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Mrs. Walton is survived by her husband, Dr. Robert J. Walton, a daughter, Mrs. Jenny Martin, whose husband is in France, and a son, Robert Walton. She was a daughter of Dr. W. H. Dent, of Waynesboro, and was prominently connected throughout the state. Mrs. Walton was universally beloved and the news of her death will cause sorrow to many hearts."

Augusta Chronicle, March 21, 1922: 'ROBERT J. WALTON, JR. IS BURIED AT HARLEM. Funeral Took Place Sunday, When Large Body of Friends Gathered. The funeral service at the home and the interment at the Harlem cemetery last Sunday at 11 o'clock of Robert Jones Walton, Jr. drew together an unusually large concourse of sorrowing friends. Church services in both churches were suspended, the Rev. Dr. Quillian, pastor of the Methodist church of which young Walton was a member, having charge of the service.

"The pallbearers were his comrades, Mess. Bailey Jones, Wilmer Lanier, Marion McDaniel, Bernard Davey, Hubert Blanchard and Richard Weeks. Among the profusion of floral

tributes, wonderfully beautiful and varied, was one especially testifying the esteem of the boys and young men of the town - a great anchor of carnations, colonial roses and valley lilies.

"It may be said that no recent death has caused more genuine distress than the untimely passing of this beloved and promising young man. Handsome, genial and unoffending, Rob Walton was as popular a young fellow as there was in the county. In his nineteenth at the University of Georgia, though his course there had been temporarily interrupted.

"The circumstances of the accident causing death were peculiarly painful. Robert and Mr. Leon M. Connor, an intimate friend, were in a car approaching a railway crossing near Campania, when the car met Bynum on horse-back. Mr. Bynum's horse shied from the train, colliding with the machine. The horse fell with a broken leg, while the car turned over. Though bruised by the fall Mr. Bynum went at once to the aid of Connor and Walton. Mr. Connor was painfully hurt, though not disabled, and was holding his unconscious companion's head in his lap, doing what they could for Robert's comfort the two gentlemen procured a car taking him at once to his father, Dr. Robert J. Walton.

"The accident occurred about six o'clock Thursday afternoon. As the injury caused traumatic meningitis, his despairing father saw from the first that no medical aid could restore him.

"Robert never regained consciousness, passing peacefully away about ten o'clock Saturday morning. Several Athens fraternity men, now at the Medical College in Augusta, as well as many other friends from abroad attended the sad funeral and extend to his sorrowing parents and sister their profound sympathy."

Robert also married (2) **Ada ZACHARY**¹. Ada was buried in Harlem Cemetery, Harlem, GA.

Information on Frances Walton Cartledge from "Lou", who wrote on to me on March 14, 2005:

Hi Virginia, Good to hear from you regarding the Walton and Cartledge family. My information is as follows:

James Cartledge, Jr., born January 13, 1796 in Columbia County, Georgia, and died in 1851. Married on December 5, 1824 to Frances G. Walton, born March 12, 1807 and died in 1861. They had six children, Their third child, Frances Walton Cartledge married Jeremiah Green Reese and they had ten children, one of whom was Jeremiah Morgan Reese who is my maternal great grandfather. It is ironic that Jeremiah Morgan Reese's sister, Frances Forrest Reese, married Morgan Henry Holloway and they are my paternal great grandparents. My parents were second cousins (believe it or not).

In 2000 I completed a book on the Holloway and Reese families. In it I put some of the extended families in it, one of which was Cartledge but I did not have a lot of information. The book had 215 pages and since that time I have added another hundred pages which does not include any of the extended families which I have also added a lot of information. I am not at the present time planning to do a second edition, but I may in the future. I have also worked on the Cartledge family and have typed approximately 130 pages, some of which I got from the internet and you know, this information is not always correct.

They added another building in 1920. The company merged with Nunnally's in 1932 to form the Fine Products Corp. The business is closed, but the buildings have been converted to office space with a common facade.

A "P. Virgil Hollingsworth" was very active in the Augusta (GA) Rotarians. 1917 through at least 1936.

"Even in retirement, Mr. Hollingsworth found the opportunity to use his business acumen in

building up a large and successful citrus industry in Florida.

"Mr. Hollingsworth loved his fellow man. His charities were many and great but unpublicized. He helped a number of hard pressed college students to complete their education when they were in danger of having to drop out of school because of lack of finances.

"A kind and gentle man, Virgil Hollingsworth won friends to him through his kindness and his other spiritual qualities. His imprint has been left upon our business, cultural, educational, religious and civil life. His death is deeply mourned in Augusta."

Augusta Chronicle, January 5, 1966: "NEWTON FLOURNOY FISKE...By any standard of human measurement, Newton Flournoy Fiske was a man of exceptional character and talent. He was a successful businessman, a conscientious civic leader, and a dedicated Christian.

In the more than half a century that he had resided in Augusta he had demonstrated his capabilities in numerous ways, never forgetting his responsibilities as a citizen, but mindful always of his obligation to God.

"Almost from the outset of his residency here, Mr. Fiske was one of the area's most substantial benefactors. Not only was he associated with the organization of Fine Products when it was formed as a successor to Hollingsworth Candy Co., and played a major role in the operations of both in the years since, but his vision and enterprise in the mid-Thirties had much to do with the development in the Central Savannah River Area of the thriving live stock industry the CSRA enjoys to this day. Recognition of the former was evidenced in his election to two terms as president of the National Confectioners Association, and of the latter in the fact that he operated and owned one of the finest Hereford beef cattle farms in the section of the country.

"Over the years, his interest in the civic life of Augusta has been made manifest in myriad ways. He was an active, and positive - as well as cheerful- contributor to the Chamber of

Commerce and as a former president and director of the Augusta Rotary Club played a prominent role in other phases of community affairs.

"That Augusta was cited during World War II as a model military center was due in large measure to Mr. Fiske's untiring and inspiring leadership of the Citizens Advisory Committee on Health and Welfare which served as a liaison between the military forces at then Camp Gordon and the various agencies within the civilian community.

Further comments: I read with great interest then entry you had for Emme Walton on page 264 of your text. Her obituary reads that she was survived by two sons and four step daughters. Now you know that she had at least one child, a daughter, who died before reaching maturity. A newspaper article about Thomas E. Norvell states that he raised seven children to maturity. An earlier article dated 1920 mentions a Thomas E. Norvell III. I am assuming that his first born son was given the family name, and that he was likely born of his first wife, so he must have had at least one son and four daughters with his first wife. I could be wrong, and T.E. Norvell III could be a son of Emme who died as a young man. I would think that some census checking could help with this.

The seed pearl studded lace yoke covered 'the cap sleeves and fell to her elbows. She carried a white prayer book showered with white orchids.' Mrs.' Phinizy chose for her daughter's wedding a triple sheer white floor length gown, -the neckline embroidered with crystal bugle beads o and wore a bouquet of white violets at the waistline. Mrs. Thomas Jones, mother of the bridegroom, was dressed in a black-floor .length dress trimmed with gold and' crystal beads. A corsage, of orchids completed her costume.

Before .the bride entered the room,. Mrs. Robert Hay Taylor, of Richmond, Va., Mrs. Robert Schwab, of Atlanta, Miss Allen Cutts, Miss Mimi Battey, Mrs. Albert Von Kamp Gary and Mrs. William Kinney descended the stairs and formed an aisle through which the bridal party passed. Since the days of Isaak Walton anglers have been prone to circulate so-called "fish tales" about their art in handling the hook and line, or in modern times the reel. But seeing is believing and here comes one that is true.

"A rockfish, of the bass tribe, weighing (24 ¾ pounds*) was caught out of the Savannah River by LEON WALTON of Ellenton, SC and displayed to local fishermen in front of the Cotton Exchange Monday morning. It is believed that the fish was the largest ever caught in the water of this section with a hook and line. People looked on it with wonder, the angler's mouths running water and the youthful branch fishermen seeing in the fish the monster of many hateful dreams.

"According to Walton, he and William Walton (his father) were fishing with artificial minnows from a boat on that part of the river where Three Rivers Creek empties into it. They were using a line which tested forty pounds when the gigantic bass struck the younger Walton's minnow. It was only after a twenty minute battle that the prize was landed, the heavy line being tested to its capacity. The fish is said to belong to a saltwater variety and had very probably made its way up the Savannah." (Note: on the 25th the newspaper corrected an error they had made in this report that the fish weighed 20 ¾ pounds, to its correct weight as shown above).

"Leon was one of the brightest students at Richmond Academy, entering the institution last fall, during which time he has made a host of friends who mourn with his family in their sad bereavement. He was taken suddenly ill just after his examination at school Tuesday afternoon and was rushed to the hospital, where everything possible was done for him but with no avail, passing away yesterday evening.

"The remains will be shipped to Ellenton, SC this afternoon at 1:45 o'clock, where the funeral services will be conducted at the Ellenton Baptist Church, of which church he was a consistent member, at 3:00 o'clock. Rev. E. H. Clark will officiate, and the interment will occur in the Ellenton cemetery.

"About 70 retiring teachers, principals and other employees of the Richmond County Board of Education were recognized during a dinner held Thursday at Augusta Area Technical School."

Following is the quote from a 1996 news article that led us to Mrs. Johnson:

"Capt. William Walton is buried off Washington Road near the Lake Cumberland subdivision. The cemetery backs up to a home and is practically hidden from the road by trees. His grave has a modern marker erected in 1973 by the Augusta and Tampa, Fla., chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Born in Virginia Feb. 11, 1754, Walton enlisted as a private in the Revolutionary Army and was promoted to captain in 1778. He also was a member of the 1781 Continental Congress. He moved to Columbia County in 1790 and died on Aug. 1, 1818. He is the first cousin of George Walton, signer of Declaration of Independence, who is buried on Greene Street.

"William Walton's great-great-granddaughter, Elizabeth Lamkin Johnson of Augusta, spent her childhood on family land that composed part of William Walton's original home site. "From Euchee Creek on up, it all belonged to the Waltons," she said.

"The Walton family owns the cemetery, where four generations of Waltons are buried. Mrs. Johnson, 76, still owns 7.5 acres of William Walton's original land grant from the king of England."

Lincolnton, GA, June 6 - One of the saddest funerals that has ever taken place in Lincoln County occurred Sunday, June 3rd, when Mr. Jesse Cartledge, who had died Saturday, was laid to rest in the cemetery in Lincolnton. The funeral took place from the Baptist Church, Dr. W. A. Hogan, the pastor, officiating.
